## West Michigan MWF Study Group Chlorine Minerals (N-Z) by Kreigh Tomaszewski


Last year we started our study of minerals that contain chlorine. Because of its great reactivity, all chlorine in the Earth's crust is in the form of ionic chloride compounds, which includes table salt (we rockhounds call it Halite). This month we finished our study of the chlorine minerals.

We use MinDat.org's Search by Chemistry function to produce an alphabetical list of minerals to study, and use the list to bring representative specimens from our collections to pass around the table. If you have seen several specimens of a mineral you are more likely to identify it correctly the next time you meet it in the field.

We started this month with the carbonate Northupite, the halogens Paratacamite, Penfieldite, and Pseudoboleite. We noted that Boleite contains Silver and Potassium that is missing in the pseudo variety.

Next we looked at the tectosilicate Quadridavyne, whose name reflects its unit-cell volume, which is QUADRupled relative to that of Davyne (which was named in honor of Sir Humphry Davy). We had a short discussion about minerals that don't have the standard -ite ending.

Getting back on track we looked at the inosilicates Richterite and Sadanagaite, and the halide Salammoniac, which sent us back into the weeds of nomenclature again. Then it was the tectosilicate Sodalite, the sulfates Spangolite and Sulphohalite, and the inosilicate Tremolite, which MinDat lists as the Tremolite-Actinolite Series. It was noted that Tremolite is often triboluminescent, meaning it gives a flash of light when the mineral is subjected to friction, impact, or breakage.

We finished up with the halide Tugtupite, which glows bright red under black light, and many wonderful specimens of the phosphate Vanadinite.

The next monthly meeting of the West Michigan MWF Mineral Study Group will be held on Tuesday, February 12, 2019, from 7 pm to 8:30 pm, at the home of Kreigh Tomaszewski, 653 Burton St. S.E., Grand Rapids, MI 49507. We will be studying minerals that contain potassium beginning with the letters A thru M. We try to start (and end) on time; please do not arrive more than 20 minutes early (and everyone gets thrown out by 9). All West Michigan rockhounds are invited to attend. I hope you can join us as we learn about minerals from each other, but you are always welcome even if you can't bring any specimens. Please join us and let part of your collection get to meet some other rockhounds and be appreciated



#### Some Etymology!

Etymology is the study of the sources and development of words, or the history of a word. What etymology of "etymology"? Well, it is:

From Middle English *etimologie*, from Old French *ethimologie*, from Latin *etymologia*, from Ancient Greek *έτυμολογία* (etumologia), from *ἕτυμον* (etumon, "true sense") and *-λογία* (-logia, "study of") (from *λόγος* (logos)).

So, it is the 'study of the true sense' of a word.

The Greek root *zo*- means "animal", so names such as Paleozoic were invented to refer to a period in the development of animal life. For geologists, the Paleozoic era is followed by the Mesozoic (*meso*- meaning "middle"), which is followed by the Cenozoic (*cen*- meaning "recent"). ("Zo" is where we get the word "Zoo".)

So, in the chart above, Paleozoic means "old animals". Mesozoic = 'middle' animals, and cenozoic – recent animals. If you know the roots of these words, then remembering the chart becomes easier!


## CAN WE FIND DINOSAUR FOSSILS IN MICHIGAN?


The answer has to do with Earth's history, the Geological Timeline. Join the Junior class in exploring Precambrian ideas older than 550 million years ago. Look at the western Upper Peninsula of Michigan, where the most ancient rocks and metal ores are near the Earth's surface... available for collecting. Look at the nested bowl idea of where younger rocks (and fossils) are exposed in Michigan's eastern UP and the southern "mitten-shaped" peninsula. Will knowing the age of exposed rock layers help you find or identify fossils? Yes!!


What kinds of fossils CAN we find in Michigan? Why? How do fossils and the rocks, that they are found hidden in, "tell a story"? Like a book with chapters, each layer of rocks/fossils are lined up (into a timeline). For example, trips to the Alpena Quarry show the Devonian animal story of Petoskey corals, Brachiopods, Favosites corals... yes, consider that underwater landscape! A construction crew in Ada, MI digs up Mammoth bones, while preparing to install a driveway. The Devonian time period was 340 million years ago! Mammoths roamed free in Michigan's grasslands 11,000 years ago. Big difference in environment and in time!! How else has our landscape changed since the Cambrian time? And where are the Dinosaur bones?


P.S. Next month, Juniors will be polishing Petoskey stones (an extinct coral from Devonian time).


